It's not just a building, it's a community resource and collaborative space that will serve as the entry point for social services to address the many complex root causes of hunger.

PeaceHealth Partnership 298 boxes

Clark County Food Bank grew a partnership with PeaceHealth that connects patients exiting the hospital or outpatient services to specialized food boxes.

Workforce Development

Through partnership with 4 colleges and 3 nonprofit organizations, Clark County Food Bank hosted 23 individuals, growing the community and the workforce through intentional engagement and skill development opportunities.



Clark County Food Bank partnered with Ren Locus who provided free tax services for people in poverty.

Unite Washington 79 referrals
